Finance Team

Our treasurer, Terry Chalmers, will be stepping down in April. The PCC has decided that a way forward for us is to pay for accountancy services to cover most of the role, and has been offered a donation to cover initial costs. We are therefore looking for one or more people to join a support team, which would include being a point of contact in the parish for finance matters, dealing with fees for funerals etc and banking weekly cash collections. We are grateful to Christine, Dee and Virginia for helping us to get up to date with Safeguarding Training and DBS checks, and in using the online tools. We are looking for a person who would be the public face of our team, as the Parish Safeguarding Officer, potentially the first point of contact for someone needing help.

Churchwarden

Steve Martin is coming to the end of the maximum 6 years that a churchwarden can serve. and we are grateful to him for agreeing to stay on for a short time as a Churchwarden's Assistant, to help a new warden to settle in. Wendy Smith will remain as Churchwarden, and we would love to hear from someone who would be willing to consider joining her in the role. It may be appropriate to become an Assistant first, then take on the full warden role at a later date.

PCC member

The Parochial Church Council are the trustees for the parish, and have a significant role in shaping the future of our mission and ministry, and in prayerful support for the parish. We will be looking for new members at the Annual Meeting. We usually meet monthly, and aim for 60 - 90 minute meetings, which often involve honest sharing about the opportunities and challenges, but also lots of laughter!

All of these roles will commence at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on April 7th and may require DBS checks and relevant safeguarding training for the role.

This month's Eco Living Ideas from Kathy



Cleaning – instead of buying single-use plastic bottles filled with assorted cleaning liquids, try using vinegar (sold in glass bottles) or citric acid (sold in cardboard boxes). The packaging is more easily recyclable, and the product can be used in many ways around the home. Put 1 tbsp citric acid or some vinegar and a cup of water in a spray bottle and shake to mix. Use to clean chopping boards, descale kettles, and spray on limescale in the bathroom and toilet. Leave a few minutes and then brush to remove the limescale. Search online for more ideas on how to use these products, and when not to use them.

Try to reduce what you buy and what packaging you buy and bring into your home. Then try to reuse anything you have left – food packaging can be re-used to store food in your cupboard or freezer, or perhaps someone else would be able to use your outgrown clothes or books you have read. Once they are of no use to anyone else, instead of sending things to landfill in your black bag, consider whether they can be put in your recycling bin. The aim is to send as little as possible to landfill.

As the climate changes, it is the most vulnerable communities who are most likely to be affected, and to suffer devastating loss and damage to their families, homes and livelihoods. These communities are often the ones least responsible for historic and current activities affecting the climate. It is important to limit how much your actions will adversely affect the climate.

<u> 2023 – An Exciting Year for St Mary's Burwell Bellringers</u>

Ringing for all the Christmas Services and events was a 'Grand Finale' to an exciting year for St Mary's, Burwell, Bellringers. It also showed our new bellringers (who were recruited from the Ring for the King Campaign in May) just what it means to be a bellringer.

Bellringers are musicians! It takes regular lessons and lots of patience and practice to be able ring a church bell, which is an exceptionally large musical instrument. Luckily for our new ringers, there is a Ringing Education Centre (REC) based at St James Stretham. Here the bells are tied so they make no sound outside the church, but they can be heard via a computer inside the ringing chamber. On a Saturday morning, ringers, from towers across the local area, learning to ring have lessons under the guidance of experienced bellringing teachers. Our new ringers also had lessons (on tied bells) before the weekly Bell ringing Practice at St Mary's Burwell.

It was an immensely proud moment for Bellringers across the world when church bells were rung for the Coronation of King Charles III on 6th May 2023.

Since then, our ringers have continued to make excellent progress, by passing their Level 1 Bellringing certificate and joining in all the activities Burwell Bellringers undertake, throughout the year. 2024 will bring more events and challenges for Burwell Bellringers. These include ringing Quarter Peals, visiting other towers on our Annual Outing as well as ringing for Weddings and other Church Services.

If anyone would like to see our bellringers in action and learn about this very English Tradition, you are always very welcome to come up to our ringing chamber (tower door at the West end of the church) on a Monday evening at 7.30pm.

Did you make a new year resolution this year? This is usually a promise to yourself about something you want to do better (or not do at all) but, unfortunately, often fails. Anyone who has read the Old Testament books, such as Exodus, chronicling the Israelites departure from Egypt and wandering in the desert in search of their promised land, cannot fail to be amazed at how often they ask God for something, receive it, promise to follow the law, and fail. Time and time again they wander from God's way, break His rules, suffer the consequences, renew their promises and then repeat their mistakes.

Any rational person would ask: why? Why not go along with God, do it His way and enjoy the clear benefits? But they don't and we are left to be amazed at their apparent obduracy, saying: of course we would be more sensible; we would not stray; we would follow the path on which are guided. But would we? Is there a clue in the way we dismiss our new year resolutions? Obviously there is – in reality we would be no better. Consider for a moment, we know what we are supposed to do and how we are supposed to behave, especially towards others (our neighbours). Do we really live up to those rules, those expectations of God of us and which we promise to adhere to? I know I fall short and I cannot believe I am the only one! I know what I am supposed to do but I come up with excuses and "reasons" for going my own way.

I write these words during the season of Epiphany, the biblical time when Jesus was revealed to the world as the Son of God. One of the consequences for us is that we are charged with passing on the Good News of salvation through Jesus to all our fellow humans. I suggest we challenge ourselves to make a belated resolution to do just that, be a light like the star of Bethlehem, welcoming all who are willing into the fellowship of Christ. Some of us are doing this directly through Alpha courses, but there is a way for all of us to do our bit. Let's see if we can keep this resolution going and make it a habit for the rest of our lives. All are welcome to attend our meetings, which include a time of prayer as well as shared food, and there is more about what the Union stands for and campaigns about on the website. **Philip Baker**


February Services
