What does love look like?

It's February, and love is all around, with Valentine's Day and all the hearts, flowers and chocolates. But love is for all year round, not just one day, and it's wider and deeper than shop-bought Valentine's Day cards can describe. You don't see many Zimmer frames, wheelchairs or hearing aids on Valentine's Day cards, but for many, the reality of love is that it is a marathon, not a sprint, with many challenges along the way: 'For better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health.' Love takes different forms: romantic love, perhaps short and sweet, but also the kind of love that is able to reach out to those who are not like us, who behave and speak differently, to welcome and include them.

One of the most popular readings chosen for weddings is 1 Corinthians 13, with its beautiful description of love: 'Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.' That's the kind of love I want to be able to live out, though I know I will fail. But as the Church's year turns to Lent on March 5th, and then Easter, we are reminded again of the love of Jesus Christ, the one who showed us the full extent of God's love, and made it possible for us to know forgiveness, no matter who we are or what we have done. Perhaps this Lent could be a time for finding out how much God loves you, and sharing that with others.

Holidays – perhaps you could choose not to fly for holidays this year? See www.flightfree.co.uk for more information and ideas. We are very grateful to Burwell Co-op and ASDA for the short life food donations towards the lunches, and also to Burwell Carnival for a £300 grant.

The inspection identified a few minor changes to make to how items are stored, including plastic crates for Foodshare items in the church porch, and also that we need to paint the kitchen, because of a few cracks in the paintwork. A member of the congregation has very kindly offered to pay for the re-decoration of the kitchen and also the downstairs lavatory for which we are very grateful.

Reflection by Philip Baker

This is the season when we look to the year ahead and start planning for all those changes that, this year without fail, we will finally get to do. Decorating a room (or more), a garden makeover, the holiday we have been thinking about for years; most, if not all, pipedreams which, if we were honest with ourselves, we know we will still be thinking about in a year's time. And yet it is human nature to want, well, almost anything! We are never content with what we have and are always planning for something different. It is a human condition.

How often do we think about what we have just celebrated - Christmas? The arrival on earth of our Saviour Jesus Christ. There can be no bigger change than this, nothing could ever be the same once God's Son was with us as a fellow human being. We need to think about what this really means for us, certainly more than His contemporaries did – they found Jesus inconvenient, what we would today call a "disrupter". And of course He was meant to be but no-one really likes having their routines disturbed do they, so they crucified Him. But that did not get rid of Him. We will soon be starting to think about what happened then - Jesus defeating death and rising again in glory, which was not the outcome the Pharisees had in mind!

Given the parlous state the world is in, largely as an outcome of all the unintended consequences of a world-full of people all individually planning changes based upon their own priorities without regard for everyone else, perhaps what we should all be wanting achieve this year is to recognise the place of God in our lives. There are no end of biblical sources supporting the general contention that if we have God in our lives we have all we need, such as Psalm 16:5 or Philippians 4:19 and the most beautiful Psalm 23. Letting God be a part of our lives and plans has a calming influence, and recognising that all we have to do is live in the footsteps of Jesus Christ (or at least try to) might give us a little peace amid all the striving of our combative world.

PCC Business

The Parochial Church Council meets most months, and significant decisions are reported to the congregation through announcements in church and through notices on the Pew Sheet or articles in Contact. Before the pandemic, there was also a folder available in St Mary's, with copies of the minutes of recent meetings.

This has now been brought back, and is on the bookshelves at the back of St Mary's, for anyone to read, as they wish. We also hope to convene a Mission and Ministry Meeting in the near future. Again, these happened regularly before Covid, and when we were working through the Partnership for Missional Church programme. Further news of a date will follow soon.

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Do you want a say about what happens in this parish now and in the future?

If the answer to this question is 'Yes', then please consider joining the church's Electoral Roll, or register of electors. In the same way that being on the civic Electoral Roll allows you to vote in parliamentary and local elections and referenda, joining the Church Electoral Roll means that you can vote on the Parish Church matters. All Church of England parishes have to completely renew their Electoral Rolls every 6 years and this renewal is due this year. Everyone who wishes to be on the Electoral Roll will therefore have to re-register by late March, so that we can publish the new roll before our Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which will be on April 27th after the 10.00am service.

The forms will be available in church from February 9th onwards, so please consider whether you would like to complete one. The Frequently Asked Questions below, which were published in Contact in 2019, give more information and we hope they will help you make your decision, but if you have any more queries, please speak to Eleanor, or one of the church wardens, or Avril Plume, who is the Electoral Roll Officer.

Why should I join the Electoral Roll?

Joining the electoral roll is an important way of confirming your commitment to the community of St Mary's and St Etheldreda's and to the vision of the Parish. By joining, you become entitled to participate in the government of the church and to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM), where the elections take place for The Parochial Church Council (PCC) and other key roles. The PCC looks after all the day to day running of the Parish, like looking after the buildings, deciding what types of service and other activities take place and how we raise and spend money. Joining the roll is an important statement of witness and a step along the path of discipleship. If you're a regular attender at our services or family activities like Messy Church or Refresh Café and interested in what kind of church we have, you should be on the electoral roll!

It is also important that we have an accurate reflection of the number of people committed to our churches as it affects the allocations we receive from central diocesan resources, and it also comes into the calculations of the proportion of a full time parish priest is appropriate for a particular parish. Contrary to some commonly held belief, however, it does not have a direct impact on the amount we have to pay over to the diocese in Parish Share.

Do I have to join?

No. You can be a full and active member of this Church without joining the Electoral Roll, but you can't have a say in any important church decisions by voting at the Annual Meeting or serving on the PCC.

Do I qualify for the Roll?

To apply for the Electoral Roll you must meet ALL the following conditions:

- You must be aged 16 or over (though you can apply in the year you become 16 and your name will be entered once your birth date has passed).
- You must be baptised.
- You must be a member of the Church of England or certain other affiliated churches (further details of this requirement are available on request).
- You must either live in the parish or have attended worship regularly for six months.

Safeguarding Training at St Mary's Burwell and St Etheldreda's Reach

Jo and I thought it would be useful to explain why, who, what and where Safeguarding Training is needed at our two churches.

Why do we need training?

It is great to have so many people contributing in different ways to Services. Weekly Events, and Special Occasions at our churches. This means that we are meeting all ages from the local community and beyond, Safeguarding is for you to be aware of any circumstances that 'do not seem quite right.' This can happen at any time and involve anyone, but in particular Young People and Vulnerable Adults. The Safeguarding Training is to make you aware of these situations, and more importantly, to let you know what to do next. It also helps you know how to not put yourself into a situation that may lead to a difficult outcome.

Who needs to be trained?

Any person who is in charge or helps with the running of any activity in our churches.

What is involved and where?

The level of Safeguarding Training that you are asked to undertake, depends on the activities in which you are involved. Everyone involved in helping at church will need to complete the first of the courses below and most will also need the second.

<u>Basic Safeguarding</u> – this is a short online course to give you details of common situations and types of abuse of which you should be aware.

<u>Foundation Safeguarding</u> – this also is a short online course which goes into more detail than the Basic Safeguarding Course.

Both courses can be completed online, or if you prefer, we can arrange a group session for several people to complete the course together in person. The time taken to complete each course can take up to 1.5 hours.

There are other Safeguarding Training Courses which a minority of people are asked to complete as part of their job role in the church.

Most training must be repeated after 3 years and you will get a reminder, either from Jo and myself or from our Church Safeguarding Hub.

Jo and I decide which type of training you are required to undertake and are very happy to answer any questions about anything you may have about Safeguarding Training.

DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) Certificate

This process investigates people's criminal records at Basic Level, which shows unspent convictions and conditional cautions and the Enhanced Level which shows both spent and unspent convictions and cautions.

One of us will ask you to complete an online form with personal details and then meet with you to check they are correct. All details are stored securely and are only shared with the Company who undertakes the DBS applications for our church.
